In 1970 the Beatles' "Let It Be" topped the charts for the year; the Vietnam War sparked anti-war protests among students nationwide; and the hippie and flower child culture was at its height. The United States of 1970 was a much different place than it is today.

The roots of the environmental movement stem from this period in history. Eartl Day 1970 used the energy from anti-war protests to bring environmental concerns to the forefront of politics; it united those concerned individuals as activists under an environmental banner.

Prior to 1970, environmental degradation was not clearly in the public consciousness. There were only small rumblings that human activities were causing disturbances in the environment. For example Rachel Carson's Silent Spring was a NY Times bestseller in 1962, however the general consensus was that poor air and water quality was simply a product of successful development and economic growth.

On April 22nd, 1970 small groups of Americans gathered to support the Earth. There were teach-ins, organizational efforts to pick up trash, trees plantings, and peaceful marches. The next day the opening line of the New York Times read, "Huge, light-hearted throngs ambled down autoless streets here vesterday as th city heeded Earth Day's call for a regeneration of a polluted environment by celebrating an exuberant rite of spring." Earth Day 1970 brought environmental activism to the mainstream, and started the flow of important environmental legislation like the Clean Air Act and Clean Water Act.

It's humbling to think that FCWC has been around long enough to witness the fir Earth Day and the passage of environmental legislation that followed. To honor half a century of environmental progress and to celebrate our favorite holiday, we would like to bring our friends outside to enjoy what these many years of work have been about: a greener, cleaner Westchester.

An Update of Westchester's solar development: Solarize Westchester



In 2012 the Cuomo administration announced its NY-SUN initiative, and followed up with a 10-year \$1 billion commitment to developing a self-sustaining solar market in New York State in April 2014. The program is designed to incentivize solar electric system installations across New York State, and hopefully lead to 3,000MW of photovoltaic (PV) installations by 2022.

Since 2012, Westchester County has had <u>over 950</u> <u>PV installations</u>, making it the county with the 2nd most installations in New York State. A new program, Solarize Westchester, is creating further momentum in the growth of the Westchester's solar market.

A new force behind Westchester's solar development: Solarize Westchester

Solarize Westchester, an initiative funded by the New

York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) through NY SUN, is designed to promote the solar industry and make solar technology more affordable and accessible to all New Yorkers. A public-private partnership, Solarize Westchester includes two program components: 1) to provide support for the adoption of solar-friendly permitting and removal or reduction of zoning restrictions and, 2) to achieve a dramatic increase in solar installations in selecte

connected people with nature as part of its three-fold mission:

to protect wildlife and habitats;
to educate all ages about the natural world; and to advocate for environmental initiatives that will preserve and protect nature for future generations.

Founded in 1953 by a small group of environmentalists, protecting six acres of wetlands; today SMRA unites over 1,100 members, maintains more than 300 acres of open space in eight sanctuaries, and oversees eight miles of trail in northern Westchester County. All sanctuaries and trails are open to the public year-round at no charge.

To help share the wonder of the natural world, SMRA offers dozens of classroom and community programs, and more than 80 public field trips; SMRA also awards a Larry Light Youth Scholarship to help a high school student further his/her environmental education.

Simply stated in SMRA's mission, this organization's role is not only to protect and educate about wildlife habitat, but to also advocate for natural ecosystems. In 2014, SMRA addressed issues pertaining to a local community's attitudes towards coyotes, and the importance of protecting nesting sites of migrating Arctic birds.

SMRA has blossomed into the organization it is today thanks to its vibrant community of members, volunteers, and friends - but there is still more to come!

(Saw Mill River Audubon is one of the original member organizations of FCWC) municipalities in a short period of time.

Since late January, when the first Solarize campaigns launched, **over 500 inquiries for information and solar site visits have been fielded and over three dozen solar contracts have been signed**. These initial pilot campaigns, ending in June, are expected to result in up to 200 new solar installations in participating communities.

How the program is designed

The Solarize Westchester Campaigns help to make solar energy system installations more accessible by <u>combining education</u>, <u>marketing and outreach efforts with a tiered pricing opportunity</u>. This means the more people that sign u for a solar installation, so adding to the group rate, the lower the price will be fo everyone.

The Solarize Westchester program includes two rounds of Solarize campaigns, each approximately five months long. During each round, the Solarize Westchester Team partners with municipalities or coalitions of municipalities. Round 1, includes the following campaigns:

Solarize Bedford-Mt. Kisco

The Town of Bedford and the Village of Mt. Kisco

Solarize Cortlandt-Croton

The Town of Cortlandt and the Village of Croton

Solarize Larchmont-Mamaroneck

The Town of Mamaroneck and the Villages of Larchmont and Mamaroneck Solarize Ossining-Briarcliff

The Town of Ossining and the Villages of Ossining and Briarcliff Manor

What's coming next: dates and deadlines

Current Solarize Westchester campaigns end in June (deadlines range from June 1st to 22nd depending on the campaign). With these deadlines approaching quickly (despite the chilly weather!), a number of important dates should be noted.

For home and business owners within those municipalities with campaigns in Round 1 (Town of Bedford, Village of Mt. Kisco, Town of Cortlandt, Village of Croton, Town of Ossining, Villages of Ossining and Briarcliff Manor, Town of Mamaroneck, and the Villages of Larchmont and Mamaroneck) **interested property owners should explore the opportunity quickly and if they intend to participate in the program, should sign their solar contract by the end of May, to ensure the group rate.**

Additionally, municipalities that did not participate in Round 1 of the Solarize campaigns should consider applying for inclusion in the second round of campaigns. More information about this process is available here http://www.solarizewestchester.com/solarize-campaigns/solarizing-your-town/

The Solarize Westchester Round 2 Request for Information will be available by mid-May and will be due at the end of June. If you would like your municipality to have a Solarize campaign, it is suggested that you shou start organizing your application soon.

Update: Algonquin Pipeline Expansion

Don't give parkland for pipeline expansion

Blue Mountain Reservation is a 1,538-acre county-run park in the northwest section of Westchester County. It features miles of trails and offers challenging hikes to the tops of two large peaks, Mt. Spitzenberg and Blue Mountain. The park is used heavily by the public.

There is also a natural gas pipeline running though the park. <u>Spectra Energy</u> is proposing to enlarge this 26-inch diameter pipeline, installed in the 1950s, to a massive 42-inch diameter, high-pressure (850 pounds per square inch) transmission pipeline. The construction would require an expanded work easement of up to 130 feet, 55 feet beyond its present 75-foot right of way.

Enlarging this pipeline and the expansion of the easements will have negative impacts on the park. There will be permanent destruction of trees and habitat fo animals. New edges will be opened a few hundred feet into the forest on either side of the expansion, which will allow invasive species to further infiltrate the park...

Tell County Executive Astorino to deny a license for Spectra Energy to expand the Algonquin pipeline in Blue Mountain Reservation. The park and its biodiversity must be preserved, not fragmented and destroyed.

Earth Day: Progress and Promise

April 22, 1980 will be "Earth Day '80". It has been declared to be the start of the "second decade of environmental progress."

The Earth Day celebration this year had an auspicious and impressive beginning. It was officially announced on January 1, 1980, on the first day of the new decade, in a Presidential Proclamation. President Carter's proclamation called upon all citizens and government officials "...to observe this day and appropriate ceremonies and activities" and that "...special attention be given to community activities and education efforts directed to protecting and enhancing our live-giving environment."



Although the characterization of this year as being the start of the "second decade of environmental progress" may seem overly optimistic about our future and excessively charitable about our recent past - there have been many changes during the past ten years. Several of these changes might be considere improvements. Perhaps these are reasons for describing the last decade as one of progress and hoping that this progress will continue in the future...
